

Factors Influencing the Pursuit of IT Certifications

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Overview

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Purpose of the Study

- An attempt to understand the factors that influence students to pursue Information Technology (IT) certification.
- By determining the factors, faculty can influence students to pursue IT certification along with their academic degree
 - Increases the chance of students gaining employment
 - Increases completion rates for the college
 - Minnesota funding is in part tied to several factors including completion rate (Omnibus Higher Education Finance Bill, 2013).

Research Question

- ResQ1: What factors affect the decision of community and technical college IT majors to pursue IT certification?
- Sub-Q 1a: Do students have a positive or negative attitude toward earning an IT certification?
- Sub-Q 1b: What impact do the beliefs of others (subjective norm) have on a student's decision to pursue IT certification?
- Sub-Q 1c: To what degree do students believe they have the items needed (perceived behavior control) to pursue IT certification?
- Sub-Q 1d: To what extent do students believe IT certification will have positive influence on their employment benefits (cognition)?
- Sub-Q 1e: To what degree do students have positive feelings towards IT certification (affect)?

Study Participants

- Minnesota community and technical college students
 - AS or AAS IT program
 - Within 1 year of graduation

- Demographics

- Participation

- 13 colleges met the qualification criteria
- Students from 12 of the 13 colleges participated

Theory

- Theory of Planned Behavior

- **Behavior**

- The degree of control a person has over internal and external factors (Ajzen, 1985).

- **Intention**

- Cognitive representation of how ready a person is to complete a certain behavior and is the immediate antecedent of a behavior

- **Attitude**

- Either positive or negative and thus can determine the undertaking of a behavior (Ajzen, 1991).

- **Affect**

- How a person will feel emotionally (i.e., happy, sad, fear, anger, envy) about doing a particular behavior (Hunsinger and Smith, 2008)

Theory (cont'd)

– Perceived Behavioral Control

- A person's perception of his/her ability to perform a specific behavior and the level of difficulty for completion (Ajzen, 1991).

– Cognition

- How a person believes he/she will feel about doing a particular behavior (Hunsinger and Smith, 2008)

– Subjective Norm

- People's beliefs and how he/she thinks those close to them will view a particular behavior (Ajzen, 1991).

Theory (cont'd)

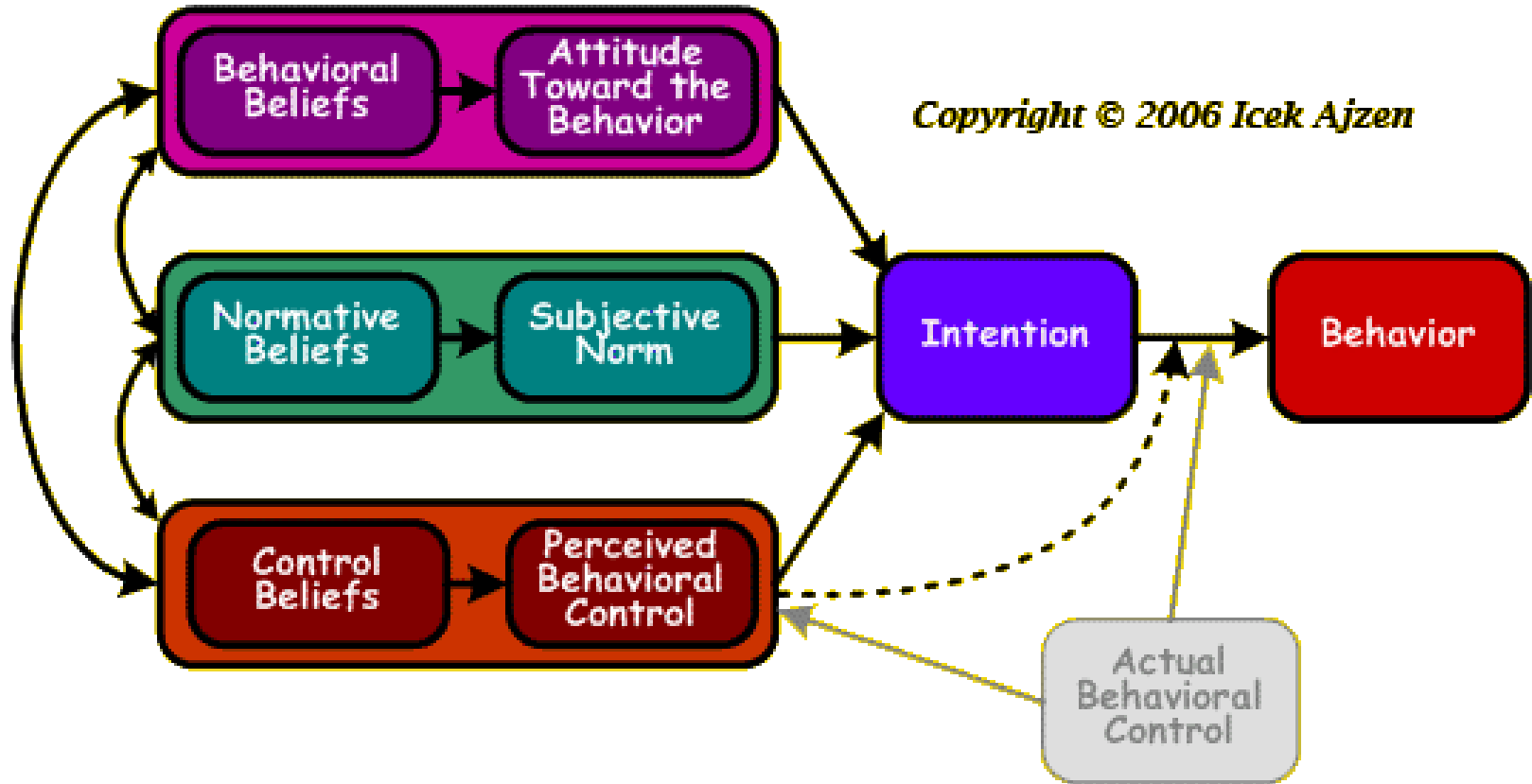


Figure 1: Theory of Planned Behavior. From Theory of Planned Behavior Diagram, 2006. Copyright 2006 by Icek Ajzen. Retrieved from <http://people.umass.edu/aizen/tpb.diag.html>. Reprinted with permission.

Results

- **Referent Groups**

- Measured Subjective Norm
- “_____ think I should pursue an IT certification within the next twelve months”

- Professors 81.5%
- IT Managers 75%
- Advisors 71.8%

Results

- **Self-efficacy**

- The study determined the level of Perceived Behavioral Control through self-efficacy
- “I _____ to earn an IT certification within the next twelve months”
- Learning ability 97.6%
- Knowledge 93.5%
- Skills 92.7%
- Money and Resources 71.8%

Results

- **Salient Beliefs**

- Used to measured cognition
- “Earning an IT certification within the next twelve months in the area noted on the previous page:”

- Increase marketability to potential employers 99.2%
- Likelihood of getting hired 97.6%
- Differentiate me from other candidates 97.6%

Results

- **Affect**

- Positive emotions
- “I would _____ pursuing an IT certification in the next twelve months”

- Proud 89.5%
- Happy 80.6%
- Excited 73.4%
- Love 73.4%

Conclusions

- Each construct examined has an impact on pursuing IT certification.
- Students attitude has the largest impact when deciding to pursue IT certification
- Students generally have a positive view of certification
- Professors were the single largest influence
- Money and resources were the largest hindrances
- Learning ability was the greatest enabler
- Marketability is the largest area of Cognition (thinking)
- Pride is the largest area for Affect (emotion)
